ORDINANCES

“O” 35-19)

On motion of Trustee Virruso seconded by Trustee Cava, the Ordinance amending Chapter 94, entitled “Traffic”, Section 94-458, entitled “Definitions; Fee for Removal of Immobilization Device; Fees for Vehicle Towing and Storage” of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Cicero, Illinois, was accepted, placed on file and approved for passage by the following vote:

(Purpose of Ordinance)

(The purpose of this ordinance is to update existing regulations and to authorize the President and or other Town officials to take all action necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.)

Section 94-458: Definitions; Fee for Removal of Immobilization Device; Fees for Vehicle Towing and Storage.

- (a) Definitions. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Administrative Fees means fees that are imposed in cases where a vehicle is released to an insurance company or lienholder/finance company and is stored for a period of five (5) calendar days or more, causing additional paperwork and labor to be completed by Town personnel. Administrative Fees shall also apply when Town personnel must tow the vehicle out of the contracted towing company lot. The additional pull-out fee of \$25.00 would not apply in these circumstances.

Clean Up Fee means a fee that is imposed after an accident and Town personnel and/or public safety personnel must clear the streets of all debris created by said accident for the safety of vehicles, pedestrians and other users of the streets and sidewalks in the area of the accident. A Clean Up Fee is designed to reimburse the Town for additional time, labor and disposal costs associated with site clean-up related to accidents and/or towed vehicles.

Flat-Bed Tow Truck means a truck with a long empty bed with a flat top where hydraulics are used to move the flatbed upwards and downwards for easy loading and unloading of towed vehicles, where vehicles can be driven onto the ramp or bed, or pulled or pushed onto the ramp or bed of the truck.

Tow Dollies means equipment that is utilized for all wheel drive vehicles, along with some front and rear drive vehicles depending on the make and model. The dolly is a smaller, portable axle which allows the vehicle to be moved without damaging the drive axles. Use of Tow Dollies in the towing of a vehicle is slightly more labor intensive as compared to a traditional tow.

Winch Fees means fees that are imposed in the event where a winch needs to be used in order to move a vehicle. Typically, winches are used when a vehicle rolls over and become stuck in ditches. In that case, a winch is used to pull the vehicle out of the ditch and roll said vehicle over to remove it from hazardous areas or situations. The use of a winch requires additional equipment, time and labor and thus, requires an additional fee.

Window Coverings means equipment that is used where any vehicle, typically after accidents, arrives on the lot with a broken or shattered window, or the window cannot be rolled up. This is a protective measure for the vehicle owner for safekeeping against weather damage.

(b) _____ The fee for the removal of an immobilization device on a vehicle shall be \$100.00.

(c) _____ The fees for vehicle towing and storage are as follows:

- (1) Passenger car towing fee:.... \$140.00.
 - a. Storage per day ... \$40.00
 - (2) Van, sport utility vehicle (SUV), pickup truck or motorcycle: \$150.00.
 - (3) In the event that a specialized towing vehicle is required to tow any vehicle, including commercial vehicles, the vehicle owner shall bear any and all costs associated with towing said vehicle.
 - (4) Storage fee per day for all vehicles: \$40.00.
 - (2) Small to Mid-sized Sport utility vehicle (SUV), Mini-Van and Motorcycle towing fee.... \$150.00.
 - a. Storage per day ... \$50.00.
 - (3) Large Sport utility vehicle (SUV), Pick-up Truck and Commercial Vehicle towing fee.... \$160.00.
 - a. Storage per day \$60.00.
 - (4) In the event any vehicle requires the use of a Flatbed Tow Truck, the amount added to base towing fee shall be \$20.00.
 - (5) In the event any vehicle requires the use of a Tow Dolly, the amount added to the base towing fee shall be \$40.00.
 - (6) In the event any vehicle requires the use of a Winch, the amount added to the base towing fee shall be \$50.00.
 - (7) In the event Town personnel is required to provide clean-up of a large quantity of wreckage or debris, which shall be defined as clean-up requiring at least 20 or more minutes of clean-up, the amount added to the base towing fee shall be \$30.00.
 - (8) In the event any vehicle requires Window Coverings, the following fees shall apply:
 - a. Per Side Window \$10.00.
 - b. Per Front or Rear Window ... \$15.00.
 - (9) Administrative Fees shall apply for all vehicles requiring release to an insurance company, lien-holder/finance company in the amount of \$30.00.
 - (10) Lock-outs shall be provided free of service to Town of Cicero residents.
 - a. In the event any vehicle requires lock-outs services and the owner is a non-resident, the fee shall be \$40.00.
 - (11) In the event of the need of jump-starting services, the fee shall be \$40.00.
 - (12) In the event a vehicle requires Town personnel to remove the vehicle off of a Town-owned impound lot, the fee shall be \$25.00.
 - (13) In the event that a specialized towing vehicle is required to tow any vehicle, including but not limited to commercial vehicles, the vehicle owner shall bear any and all costs and fees associated with towing said vehicle.
- (a) All vehicles registered in the Town of Cicero, or that by law should be registered in the Town of Cicero, must have a valid Town of Cicero vehicle tag or sticker to be released.

On motion of Trustee Reitz seconded by Trustee Virruso, the Ordinance amending Chapter 50, entitled “Law Enforcement”, Section 50-192, entitled “Part-Time Police Officers”, of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Cicero, Illinois regarding Part-Time Police Officers, was accepted, placed on file and approved for passage by the following vote:

(Purpose of Ordinance)

(The purpose of this ordinance is to update existing regulations and to authorize the President and or other Town officials to take all action necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.)

Section 50-192: Part-Time Police Officers.

- (d) *Employment Application.* All candidates for the position of Part-Time Police Officer shall make application on forms as determined by the board of Fire and Police Commissioners and must be at least 23 years of age and not more than 62 years of age at the time of application and shall submit with that application the following:
- (1) Certified copy of birth certificate;
 - (2) Certified copy of naturalization papers, if applicable;
 - (3) Copy of valid Illinois Driver's License; and
 - ~~(4) Copy of high school diploma or GED; and~~
 - ~~(5) Copy of college transcripts (minimum of 30 credit hours); or~~
 - (4) Copy of current Certification issued by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board.
- (e) *Qualifications and Hiring Standards.* All persons employed as Part-Time Police Officers must meet the following standards:
- (1) Must be of good moral character, of temperate habits, of sound health, and physically and mentally able to perform assigned duties;
 - (2) Must not possess any felony convictions or any misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, as specified in 65 ILCS 5/10-2.1-6 of the Fire and Police Commissioners Act;
 - (3) Must not be the Respondent to an order of protection;
 - (4) Must not have been dismissed from any public service for good cause;
 - (5) Must not have attempted to practice or practices any deception or fraud in his or her application for employment;
 - (6) Must not be found to have unsatisfactory character and employment reference(s);
 - (7) Must not have been convicted of any DUI or other misdemeanor traffic offenses or had his or her driver's license suspended or revoked within two (2) years prior to application;
 - (8) Any individual who has served in the U.S. military must have been honorably discharged;
 - (9) At the time of hire must have been previously trained and certified in accordance with the Illinois Police Training Act (50 ILCS 705/1 et seq.) and the rules and requirements of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB);
 - (10) Must qualify for a State of Illinois Firearm Owner's Identification card;
 - (11) Must successfully complete polygraph and psychological testing, fingerprinting and background check;
 - (12) Must successfully complete a physical and drug testing;
 - (13) Must be qualified to enter and successfully complete any training mandated by the ILETSB. That the aforesaid hiring standard, with respect to Part-Time Police Officers employed by the Town of Cicero, Cook County, Illinois, shall be submitted to the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board, as directed by statute.

- (f) *Discipline and Discharge.* All Part-Time Police Officers are at-will employees and may be terminated at any time without notice and without hearing, unless otherwise provided or required by an existing collective bargaining agreement. Nothing contained in this Code or the Town Personnel Manual shall be construed as a contract or property right. Part-Time Police Officers shall comply with all applicable rules and General Orders issued by the Cicero Police Department and the Superintendent of Police or his or her designee;
- (g) Every Part-Time Police Officer who has attained the age of 63 shall be separated from employment immediately. It shall be the duty of every Part-Time Police Officer 60 days before they attain the age of 63 to inform the Superintendent of Police in writing that such will be the case. Any Part-Time Police Officer who does not provide such notice to the Superintendent of Police shall be separated from employment as soon as the Town is made aware of such failure, even if they have not yet attained age 63.

On motion of Trustee Virruso seconded by Trustee Porod, the Ordinance amending Chapter 10, entitled “Alcoholic Beverages”, Section 10-59, entitled “Restrictions on Issuance” of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Cicero, Illinois, was accepted, placed on file and approved for passage by the following vote:

(Purpose of Ordinance)

(The purpose of this ordinance is to authorize the Town President to take any and all action necessary in conformity therewith.)

Section 10-59: Restrictions on Issuance.

- (a) No license required by this article shall be issued to the following:
- (1) A person who is not a resident of the town.
 - (2) A person who is not of good character and reputation in the community in which he resides.
 - (3) A person who is not a citizen of the United States.
 - (4) A person who has been convicted of a felony under any federal or state law.
 - (5) A person who has been convicted of being the keeper of or is keeping a house of ill fame.
 - (6) A person who has been convicted of pandering or other crime or misdemeanor opposed to decency and morality.
 - (7) A person whose license issued under the Liquor Control Act of 1934 (235 ILCS 5/1-1 et seq.), this chapter or any other ordinance has been revoked for cause.
 - (8) A person who at the time of application for renewal of any license issued would not be eligible for such license upon a first application.
 - (9) A co-partnership, unless all of the members of such copartnership shall be qualified to obtain a license.
 - (10) A corporation, if any officer, manager or director thereof or any stockholder owning in the aggregate more than five percent of the stock of such corporation would not be eligible to receive a

license under this article for any reason other than citizenship and residence within the political subdivision.

- (11) A person seeking a license to permit consumption of alcohol on the premises, whose place of business is conducted by a manager or agent, unless the manager or agent possesses the same qualifications required of a licensee.
 - (12) A person who has been convicted of a violation of any federal or state law concerning the manufacture, possession or sale of alcoholic liquor, subsequent to January 31, 1934, or who shall have forfeited his bond to appear in court to answer charges for any such violation.
 - (13) A person who does not own the premises for which a license is sought or does not have a lease thereon for the full period for which the license is to be issued.
 - (14) Any law enforcing public official, any mayor, alderman or member of a city council or commission, any president of the village or town board of trustees, or any president or member of a county board, and no such official shall be interested in any way, either directly or indirectly, in the manufacture, sale or distribution of alcoholic liquor.
 - (15) Any person not eligible for a state retail liquor dealer's license.
 - (16) Any person, partnership or corporation who has, within 12 months immediately preceding the application, been denied a license of the same class. For purposes of this subsection, the 12-month period commences on the first day after the order denying the license becomes final and no longer subject to appeal.
 - (17) Any person who is indebted to the town for any license fee, tax, judgment, or fine.
 - (18) Any person with an address wherein there is any amount due and owing to the town for any overdue water or sewer service bill.
 - (19) Reserved.
 - (20) A corporation, unless it is incorporated in this state or unless it is a foreign corporation which is qualified under the Business Corporation Act of 1983 (805 ILCS 5/1.01 et seq.) to transact business in this state.
 - (21) A person whose place of business is conducted by a manager or agent, unless the manager or agent possesses the same qualifications required by the licensee.
 - (22) A person who is not a beneficial owner of the business to be operated by the licensee.
 - (23) A person who has been convicted of a gambling offense as proscribed by 720 ILCS 5/28-1(a)(3)—(a)(11), 5/28-1.1 or 5/28-3, or as proscribed by a statute replaced by any of such statutory provisions.
 - (24) A person to whom a federal wagering stamp has been issued by the federal government, unless the person is eligible to be issued a license under the Raffles Act (230 ILCS 15/0.1 et seq.) or the Illinois Pull Tabs and Jar Games Act (230 ILCS 20/1 et seq.).
 - (25) A person/applicant who owns and/or operates a business or premises for which a liquor license is sought that refuses to consent to periodic inspections of the licensed premises as required by section 10-74 of this Code.
 - (26) A person or applicant who owns and/or operates a business or premises upon which the primary purpose of the business or its products sold are normally marketed to children under the legal drinking and gambling age (21 years of age) and who is seeking an on-premises consumption license. Examples include ice cream shops/stores, candy stores, confectionaries, popsicle shops, toy stores, and other similar businesses.
 - (27) A person or applicant who owns and/or operates a business or premises operated as a laundromat, barbershop, beauty parlor, or other similar business and who is seeking an on-premises consumption license.
- (b) No liquor license shall be issued to any person, club or other entity unless the applicant shall submit with his initial application or application for renewal a certificate of public liability insurance, insuring the dram shop against bodily injury or death in an amount not less than \$20,000.00 for each person and \$60,000.00 for each occurrence. Such insurance policy shall also protect against loss of means of support resulting from the death or injury of any person in an amount of not less than \$15,000.00 for each person and \$50,000.00 for each occurrence. Such policy of insurance shall contain a clause that no cancellation shall take place until and unless the town department of liquor control is given 30 days' written notice by the insurer of intention to cancel. The policy of insurance shall be placed with a

reputable insurance company. The cancellation or lapse of any policy of dram shop insurance during the term of any liquor license shall cause the immediate suspension of such license until a new policy of insurance has been produced. A current certificate of paid insurance shall be kept on file with the department of liquor control at all times during the effectiveness of any liquor license.
