Cicero Honors Firefighters Who Saved Homeowner's Life

On May 28, Town President Larry Dominick, the Cicero Board of Trustees and the Cicero Fire Department presented honors to four firefighters for saving the life of a woman who was trapped in a burning apartment building last February.

Fire Chief Jeff Penzkofer said that at 8 p.m. on Feb. 16, firefighters responded to an emergency fire call at 2123 55th Court, a four-story apartment building with more than 30 units.

"The first responders immediately saw a woman who was leaning out of a window on the fourth floor with flames all around her and they immediately responded by raising the ladder to reach her," Penzkofer said. "But as they were raising the ladder to reach her, she backed out of the window and disappeared into the smoke and the flames."

Penzkofer, joined by Dep. Fire Chief Jonathan Sochacki, said a second team of firefighters carried a water hose through the back entrance of the building's fourth floor. They discovered and rescued

the frightened woman.

"It is kind of like the pinnacle for us at the Fire Department. It doesn't get any better than a life being saved because of some courageous act by our firefighters with the sense of urgency and just doing things the right way," Penzkofer told the Town Board at its meeting. "They put their lives in danger to save another life."

The four firefighters who were honored are Lt. Bradley Erickson, Matthew J. Lopresti, James Siciliano, and Jay Cranston.

Erickson, who rescued the victim inside the building, received the Medal of Valor. Lopresti, Siciliano, and Cranston received Citation for an Incident reflecting Bravery, Courage, and Honor for the Fire Department.

"I always say that the Cicero Fire Department and the Cicero Police Department are the best that any community can have," Dominick said.

The volunteers, a diverse group representing various sectors of our community, included students from Cicero School District 99 and Morton High School District 201. Officials of the Cicero Police Department, Cicero Fire Department, and many other departments also participated.

Food for lunch for the volunteers was provided by many local businesses, including McDonald's, Steak & Egger, Walmart, Sam's Club, Paisans Pizzeria, Waldo Cooney's Pizzeria, Anthony's Pizzeria, and Scatchell's Beef and Pizzeria.

Cicero Chaplain and Business License Director Ismael Vargas, as well as Fire Chief Jeff Penzkofer were also on hand to help coordinate the cleanup drive. Trustees Blanca Vargas and Victor Garcia rolled up their sleeves and helped the volunteers at the event.

"Every year we put together a great event to get the community to come out and clean. We work with non-profits, churches and non-government agencies to work together, to be united and to make a

difference in our community," Vargas said.

"This is a great way for people to come out and get to know each other as a community and we want to thank President Larry Dominick, Assessor Emilio Cundari for coordinating this annual event, and all of the town's board of trustees for their support."

Thousands Turn Out for Cinco de Mayo Celebration

Thousands of residents, neighbors, and fans of Cinco de Mayo gathered at the fairgrounds at 34th and Laramie for the annual celebration of Mexican American culture. The four-day festival, held from May 2 through May 5, featured folkloric dancers, carnival rides, family activities, food concessions, and live music.

This year's celebration broke attendance records as people from across the region came to experience what makes Cicero's event memorable.

"The Town of Cicero always hosts the biggest and best Cinco de Mayo celebration," said Town President Larry Dominick. "I was happy to meet so many people who came to celebrate this holiday."

This year's festival included two stages for live music, with freestyle and house music performances on Thursday and Friday nights.

"No one celebrates Mexican American culture and Cinco de Mayo more than Cicero," said Maru Ayala, head of the Cicero Mexican Cultural Committee.

The festival is a long-standing tradition in Cicero, sponsored annually by Dominick and the Board of Trustees, the CMCC, NBC Chicago, Telemundo, NBC Sports Chicago, and numerous small businesses throughout the town.

Cicero Police Command Participates in Peace Memorial

The Town of Cicero Police Department Command participated in the 23rd Annual Memorial Ceremony, which was hosted by the Peace Officers Memorial Foundation of Cook County (POMFCC) on May 10.

The Ceremony honors police officers who sacrificed to protect the public.

This year, the POMFCC honored a Cicero Police Officer, John Kane, who was killed in the line of duty on November 12, 1910.

The memorial service was held on Friday, May 10, 2024, at Cermak Woods Forest Preserve, 7601 W. Ogden Avenue, Lyons, Illinois.

Hundreds of officers from various police departments and law enforcement offices were on hand to honor Kane's memory.

Cook County Commissioner Frank Aguilar, along with Cicero Police Chief Thomas Boyle, was one of the keynote speakers at the event.

Family descendants of the slain officer were also on hand to receive a special plaque in his honor.

The Officer Down Memorial Page describes Kane's sacrifice to protect the public:

"Patrolman John Kane was shot and killed while attempting to arrest three subjects who had just robbed a saloon at West 12th Street and 52nd Avenue (present-day Roosevelt Road and Laramie Avenue) at 1:00 am.

"Patrolman Kane was on foot patrol on 50th Avenue when he heard shots fired. As he headed towards the sound of the gunfire, he witnessed three men running and ordered them to stop. Unknown to him, the three men had just robbed a saloon and shot four people during their heist. He asked them where they were running to when one of the subjects fired at Patrolman Kane. He was struck five times in the left breast, left arm, left leg, and abdomen. He returned fire.

"Another officer on patrol with Patrolman Kane engaged in a gunfight with the three subjects. When he realized one man was wounded, he confiscated his weapon and used the call box to call for backup. During that time, the other two subjects took all the cash the wounded man had stolen and fled.

"Patrolman Kane was transported to St. Anthony's Hospital, where he succumbed to his wounds.

"The investigation revealed that the bullet that killed one of the subjects was from Patrolman Kane's service weapon. A second subject was captured a few days later, and the third subject was never apprehended.

"Patrolman Kane had served with the Cicero Police Department for three years. He was survived by his wife, three sons, and two daughters."
